Who Moved My Cheese?

Over the last couple of weeks I have endured moving into our new company headquarters. In weeks leading up to the move most people chose to comment on the negative aspects of this change; everything from the lack of parking to the frustrations of working in a cubicle environment. In no way am I insinuating that I am a Saint and didn't take an occasional jab at my new surroundings; I did. I do however think I have adapted well and most of the hard feelings have gone away once the idea of the move became reality.

I can not say the same for some of my co-workers. Naturally some people are so distraught over the change they mention quitting or organizing employee uprisings. Please do not enter the building if you see individuals outfitted in "Lord of the Flies" garb! What does this have to do with safety? During this transition I could not help but ponder the changes we must endure as safety, health, and environmental professionals and how we prepare ourselves and respond to this one constant.

I cannot think of many uplifting conversation I have had with colleagues that revolved around a new CEO, changing policies or budget preparations. Those who did not plan on the move itself our how it would affect their operations tended to be more outspoken against the transition. No right answers can be found in this article, simply some reflections on my recent brush with change.

AMERICAN SOCIETY OF SAFETY ENGINEERS KICK OFF THIRD ANNUAL NAOSH KIDS' 'SAFETY- ON- THE- JOB' POSTER CONTEST

In an ongoing effort to educate children on the importance of workplace safety and health, the American Society of Safety Engineers (ASSE) today kicked off its third annual ASSE kids' 'Safety-on-the-Job' poster contest for ASSE members' children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews. The contest runs today through Feb. 14, 2005, Valentine's Day, and is broken down into four age categories.

The winning poster will best illustrate workplace safety and be featured on the annual North American Occupational Safety and Health (NAOSH) week poster distributed worldwide. NAOSH week, a week dedicated to raising awareness about the importance of workplace safety and preventing injuries, runs this May 1-7.

"Children are not aware of what their parents do when they go to work each day," ASSE President Gene Barfield, CSP, said. "This contest helps ASSE members' children understand how their parents, grandparents, aunts or uncles, work day in and day out identifying hazards and implementing safety advances in all industries and at all workplaces to help the millions of people who go to work, return home safely every day. It's also a fun contest.

"Also of major importance," Barfield added, "is the fact that children will soon be entering the workplace themselves. They need to be aware of what constitutes safety on the job for their own protection. You're never too young to learn."

The poster contest is open to ASSE members' children, grandchildren, nieces or nephews between the ages of 5 and 12. There are four age categories with a winner selected from each age group which includes: 1) ages 5-6; 2) ages 7-8; 3) ages 9-10; and, 4) ages 11-12. An independent panel of judges will select the four winning entries that best illustrate the theme "Safety on the Job." Each age group winner receives a \$1,000 savings bond. All entrants receive a prize.

This year's PDC topic concentrates on what we all hope as safety professionals will never happen, but what we recognize we have to be prepared for – ***working with the news media during a major crisis and how to properly investigate serious accidents.*** Janine Reid is a leading authority on crisis management planning and working with the news media during the event. She has also served as a coach to management and field personnel during and after crisis situations.

In addition, we are pleased to have John Miles, Regional Administrator for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, Region VI, speak to us following lunch regarding some of the more expensive OSHA citations written over the past year and what the Region plans to focus on in the upcoming year. Mr. Miles is a VERY entertaining speaker – you don't want to miss the opportunity to hear his presentation or ask him any of the questions you may have on your mind!!

In accordance with our earlier presentation, the afternoon session of the conference highlights accident investigation procedures associated with a significant event. OSHA Reminds Employers to Post Injury

Illness Summaries Beginning February 1

Beginning February 1, employers must post a summary of the total number of job-related injuries and illnesses that occurred last year. Employers are only required to post the Summary (OSHA Form 300A) -- not the OSHA 300 Log -- from Feb.1 to Apr. 30, 2005.

Employers with ten or fewer employees and employers in certain industry groups are normally exempt from federal OSHA injury and illness record keeping and posting requirements. A complete list of exempt industries in the retail, services, finance and real estate sectors is posted on OSHA's Web site.

Exempted employers may still be selected by the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics to participate in an annual statistical survey. All employers covered by OSHA need to comply with safety and health standards and must report verbally within eight hours to the nearest OSHA office all accidents that result in one ore more fatalities or in the hospitalization of three or more employees.
